Your Association is pleased to advise that we held a successful Annual General Meeting (AGM) and have a few new Committee members and we Welcome their input.

Our Good Morning Vietnam, Musical was an outstanding success in March raising over \$10,000 to assist Veterans and War Widows, which in fact is the reason for the Associations existence. I thank everyone who came to the Show, and we are looking at having a similar show in 2024 so watch this space.

2023 is a challenging Year with interest rate and inflation increases and I hope all us members are ok. We have our 2023 raffles starting soon so any assistance in selling/buying tickets will greatly be appreciated.

## WELLBEING REPORT

Budget 2023 At a Glance

The Government has allocated an additional \$328M over four years to support the more than 340,000 veterans & dependents accessing DVA services. This builds on the \$537M allocated in the October 2022 Budget.

An amount of \$64M in 2023/24 will retain the 500 staff who deliver frontline services. Of interest DVA continue the "fluctuation" policy, this means frontline staff will be increased/ decreased as the need arises.

To modernise the ageing IT systems an amount of \$254M has been allocated over the next four years to stabilise/modernise current systems, some systems are over 25years old. I should explain, when a Disability Claim is received & certain parameters are evident, a computer provides an immediate positive decision (not quite AI but getting there). If the claim detail is not evident then an Integrated Support Hub looks at the claim, finally a Delegate & if necessary, a Team Leader assess the claim.

A change to the Acute Support Package with \$500K over four years for Grandparents to now be eligible, if they are full time carers of grandchildren if veterans are incapable of providing care due to mental/physical disabilities.

An amount of \$2M over two years to continue Mental Health Awareness & Suicide Intervention Training for volunteers, this training to be provided by Open Arms.

The fees paid to GPs & Specialists are already above the general rate, with GPs for example being paid 115% of the Medicare rate plus a Supplementary Veteran Access Payment. Also, as an example, GPs are paid \$16.00 a page to complete reports requested by DVA. There is to be a tripling of the bulk billing initiative with \$33M over four years.

## Padre's Corner The Search for Peace through Sacrifice

Hello Everyone,

Recently Christians celebrated Easter; recently we commemorated ANZAC Day; each of these major events in history, speak of sacrifice, sacrificial love, duty, and death however, only one event speaks of Resurrection and Eternal Life. For Christians Easter is a major religious festival of our year, it is the culmination of the message of Christmas. For Christians it was the celebration of Christ's death and resurrection. The Easter Story is summed up in the in the following words.

# Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb.

But Easter commemorates not simply an empty tomb, rather the sacrifice of Christ on the Cross and his resurrection in fulfillment of the prophecies of the early prophets. It is a most important Christian festival for all believers. Without Christ's resurrection on that first Easter Day there would be no Christian faith, for the basis of our Christian faith is the birth, death and resurrection and ascension of Christ.

While we continue to reflect on the true message of Easter, we move onto the sacrifices made on that first ANZAC Day, and in many wars and conflicts since; what does ANZAC Day mean to the average Australian today? For others it may be attending an ANZAC Day March or watching the March on TV.

However, we observe ANZAC Day, we must remember that the true message of ANZAC Day, is not a message to glorify war, it is a message of sacrifice and service by a few for the benefit of many! Like the message of Easter, it is a message of hope for the future.

Winston Churchill's tribute to Battle of Britain Pilots remains true today of all who served in the cause of peace.

"Never was so much owed by so many to so few."

Christ's Message or teaching on sacrifice,

### Greater love has no man that he should give his life for another (John 15:13)

which is found on War Memorials throughout the world, is particularly significant as we observe ANZAC Day and highlights the sacrifices of others for us. 

## **RAS Badge**

I noticed at both this year's ANZAC Day and Vietnam Veteran's Day Marches & Services that many veterans are wearing their RAS Badge as well as their medals. The correct protocol for wearing the RAS Badge is outlined below. You will notice also that the protocol has changed from "Active Service" to "Warlike Service".

The Returned from Active Service Badge (RAS Badge) is issued to Australian Defence Force personnel who have rendered warlike service. Its purpose is to enable individuals to display their involvement in warlike service while in civilian attire, where the wearing of a medal denoting their service is not appropriate. The ability for veterans to wear a badge recognizing the service and sacrifice in rendering war service to Australia is a befitting tribute to these veterans.



For those of our members who are also members of the RSL, the RSL Protocol Regulation states: **"Wearing of the Returned from Active Service Badge 8.16** The Returned from Active Service Badge (RAS Badge) is issued to indicate a person who has returned from active service with the ADF whilst in civilian dress. It is not to be worn in uniform. It is not necessary to wear the RAS Badge on a suit jacket along with medals, as the medals more accurately indicates ones service to the nation"

Remember it was introduced after WW1 when men often would display their allegiance to a club or organisation by wearing a lapel badge. I would ask Association members to abide by the RAS Badge protocol.

## 50th Anniversary Medallion & Certificate



To acknowledge the 50th anniversary of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War, the Department of Veterans' Affairs will produce a Commemorative Medallion and Certificate of Commemoration.

The medallion and certificate will be made available to every living veteran, widows of veterans and other family members of veterans of the Vietnam War. Please note that only one medallion is available per Vietnam War veteran.

The obverse design will feature the Commonwealth Coat of Arms with 'Vietnam War' inscribed at the top and "Australia remembers' at the bottom. The medallion reverse design will feature words of thanks at the bottom with the years 1962-73 inscribed at the top to represent the years in which Australia was involved in the Vietnam War. The medallion also features a UH-1 Iroquois "Huey" Helicopter, a depiction of HMAS Sydney (III) "Vung Tau Ferry" and an Australian soldier holding an SLR.

The medallion will be presented in a display case and will include a card that explains the design and contains a brief expression of thanks.

The design of the commemorative certificate will complement the medallion. The design includes the Commonwealth Coat of Arms, 'Australia Remembers' wording and includes the signature of both the Governor-General and the Prime Minister.

The certificate will be contained within its own folder, allowing for independent display, framing and mounting.
